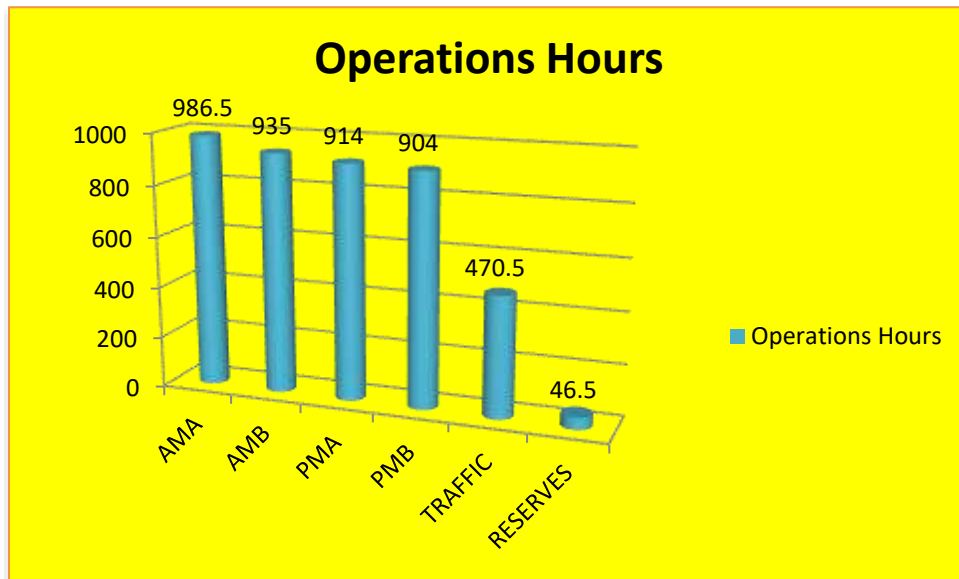

### Hours

During the month of June, officers of the Operations Division worked a total of 4,210 hours. 46.5 total work hours were completed by Non-Probationary Reserve Officers not in the FTO program.

## **Highlights**

On June 2<sup>nd</sup>, Cpl. David Shedrow initiated a traffic stop for an infraction. Upon contact with the driver, Cpl. Shedrow observed signs of narcotics use about the driver. Cpl. Shedrow deployed his police K9 around the vehicle. The K9 showed positive indication of narcotics in the vehicle. A search revealed suspected marijuana, methamphetamine, and drug paraphernalia. The driver and passenger were charged and transported to jail.

On June 3<sup>rd</sup>, Officer Cody Molina initiated a traffic stop for an infraction. Cpl. David Shedrow assisted with the stop and deployed his police K9 around the vehicle. The K9 showed positive indication of narcotics in the vehicle. A search revealed suspected cocaine, drug paraphernalia, and prescription narcotics. The driver was charged and transported to jail.

On June 4<sup>th</sup>, Cpl. Dan Brinson initiated a traffic stop on a suspected impaired driver. Cpl. Brinson immediately observed signs of impairment and detected the odor of alcohol about the driver. Cpl. Brinson administered one test that the driver failed. The driver could not complete the remaining tests and consented to a certified breath test. The driver was transported to the Brownsburg Police Department where the test was administered. Results of the test exceeded the legal limit. The driver was charged and transported to jail.

On June 5<sup>th</sup>, Brownsburg Officers responded to a report of vandalism on the B&O Trail accessible via Fullwood Drive. It was reported that derogatory comments had been spray painted on the trail. It was reported that multiple juveniles were seen in the area but no further information could be provided. There were additional reports of spray paint on the trail on June 12<sup>th</sup> and 23<sup>rd</sup>. No suspect information was provided at the time of the reports.

On June 6<sup>th</sup>, Officer Taylor Adamson responded to the area of the dog park on Hornaday road regarding graffiti on the walls of the restroom. There was no suspect information provided at the time of the report. There is video surveillance on this property and will be viewed to determine if suspect information could be obtained.

On June 14<sup>th</sup>, Cpl. Dan Brinson observed a disabled vehicle in the roadway on Green Street. It appeared that the driver had struck a curb rendering the vehicle disabled. While speaking with the driver, Cpl. Brinson observed signs of impairment and detected the odor of alcohol. Cpl. Brinson administered sobriety tests to the driver. The driver failed all testing and consented to a certified breath test. The driver was transported to the Brownsburg Police Department where the test was administered. Results of the test exceeded the legal limit. The driver was charged and transported to jail.

---

On June 15<sup>th</sup>, Officer Karanveer Singh initiated a traffic stop for an infraction. Upon identifying the occupants, Officer Singh observed deceptive behavior. Officer David Marcum assisted and deployed his police K9 around the vehicle. The K9 showed positive indication of narcotics in the vehicle. A search revealed several syringes used to inject narcotics into the body along with other drug paraphernalia. The occupant whom the syringes and paraphernalia belonged to was charged and transported to jail.

On June 16<sup>th</sup>, Sgt. Chris Nelson responded to a report of a suspicious vehicle on Derby Way. Upon arrival, Sgt. Nelson conducted a welfare check and learned that the driver had an active warrant out of Bartholomew County. The warrant was verified and the driver was taken into custody and transported to jail.

On June 17<sup>th</sup>, Officer Taylor Adamson responded to Lacabreah Drive regarding a suspicious vehicle. On arrival, Officer Adamson located two subjects sleeping in the vehicle. Officer Adamson also detected the odor of burnt marijuana emanating from the interior of the vehicle. Upon identifying the occupants, one occupant had a felony warrant out of Ohio. The warrant was confirmed and the occupant was taken into custody and transported to jail.

On June 17<sup>th</sup>, Sgt. Chris Nelson responded to a report of a possible impaired driver on 56<sup>th</sup> Street. Sgt. Nelson located the vehicle and observed the driving behavior. Sgt. Nelson initiated a traffic stop and observed signs of impairment about the driver. The driver admitted to consuming alcohol and was administered sobriety testing. The driver failed all testing and consented to a certified breath test. The driver was transported to the Brownsburg Police Department where the test was administered. Results of the test exceeded the legal limit. The driver was charged and transported to jail.

On June 17<sup>th</sup> Officer Megan Clonce initiated a traffic stop for an infraction. Upon identifying the occupants of the vehicle, Officer Clonce observed deceptive behavior. Cpl. David Shedrow assisted with the stop and deployed his police K9 around the vehicle. The K9 showed positive indication of narcotics in the vehicle. The passenger also told officers that the driver was “high” referring to impairment. A search revealed multiple drug paraphernalia items along with possible stolen merchandise. The driver was charged and transported to jail. Upon request and execution of a search warrant, multiple clothing items and miscellaneous tools were recovered.

On June 18<sup>th</sup>, Officer Lucio Argueta initiated a traffic stop on a suspected impaired driver. Upon contact with the driver, Ofc. Argueta detected the odor of alcohol about the driver. The driver also displayed signs of impairment and admitted to consuming alcohol. Ofc. Argueta administered sobriety testing to the driver. The driver failed all testing and initially consented to a certified test in the form of a blood draw then refused to consent to the blood draw. A search warrant was requested and obtained from a judge. The driver was transported to a medical facility where the draw was administered. Upon completion, the driver was charged and transported to jail. Further investigation revealed that the driver possessed suspected cocaine and drug paraphernalia. The driver was also charge with the narcotics violation.

On June 22<sup>nd</sup>, PMA shift officers responded to a residence on Fish Hawk Court regarding a domestic disturbance. It was reported that the suspect had fled the scene. Upon arrival, officers began their investigation and learned that the victim had sustained injuries. While completing the investigation, officers located the suspect vehicle in Brownsburg via Flock camera and conducted a traffic stop. Officer Jason Umbanhowar continued his investigation and determined that the driver (also the suspect) had been consuming alcohol. Sobriety testing was administered to the driver. The driver failed all testing and refused a certified test. A blood draw search warrant was requested and obtained from a judge. The driver was transported to a medical facility where the draw was administered. Upon completion, the driver was charged and transported to jail. Additionally, the driver was charged with domestic violent with injury and with a deadly weapon, and criminal confinement.

On June 24<sup>th</sup>, Cpl. David Shedrow initiated a traffic stop for an infraction. Upon identifying the driver, Cpl. Shedrow observed the driver to display abnormal behavior. Cpl. Shedrow deployed his police K9 around the vehicle. The K9 showed positive indication of narcotics in the vehicle. A search revealed suspected cocaine, methamphetamine, and drug paraphernalia. The driver was charged and transported to jail.

On June 26<sup>th</sup>, Officer Joe Medjeski responded to a report of a crash involving a possible impaired driver. On arrival, Officer Medjeski observed one of the driver to show signs of impairment. The driver admitted to consuming alcohol. The driver refused sobriety testing and a certified breath test. Officer Medjeski requested and obtained a blood draw search warrant from a judge. The driver was transported to a medical facility where the draw was administered. Upon completion, the driver was charged and transported to jail. No injuries were reported in the crash.

---

On June 28<sup>th</sup>, Officer Heather Foote initiated a traffic stop on a suspected impaired driver. Upon contact, Officer Foote observed signs of impairment and detected the odor of alcohol emanating from the interior of the vehicle. Officer Foote requested the driver to exit the vehicle. The driver refused sobriety testing and a certified test. Officer Foote requested and obtained a blood draw search warrant from a judge. The driver was transported to a medical facility where the draw was administered. Upon completion, the driver was charged and transported to jail. Additionally, the driver was charged for marijuana possession.

K9 training took place on June 19<sup>th</sup> and 26<sup>th</sup>. Narcotics training consisted of outdoor searches where product was hidden in trailers and indoor searches where product was place in high and low areas. Additionally, there were bulk hides where large trashcans were utilized. Patrol training consisted of obedience on bite drills and decoys. The K9 would then be recalled to the handlers. Additional training consisted of large indoor searches of a school building with classrooms.

**FTO**

There was no field training activity during the month of June. Officer Chris Jones was sworn in on June 30<sup>th</sup> and is scheduled to begin field training on July 7<sup>th</sup>.

---

## **Use of Force**

The Brownsburg Police Department documented six (6) Use of Force Reports during the month of June. The reports are classified as follows: Weaponless Physical, Firearms Pointing, and Other (Spike Strips).

Documented reports 1-2 involved Brownsburg Officers responding to a trouble with person call for service. The subject was located operating a vehicle and was extremely intoxicated. The subject was uncooperative during the investigation and was placed in handcuffs to be charged with crimes. The subject screamed profanities while officers attempted to de-escalate the situation. At one point, the subject stood up and attempted to walk away from officers while continually being disorderly. Officers had to physically restrain the subject during the investigation. The subject was charged and transported to jail.

Documented report 3 involved Brownsburg Officers responding to a violent domestic call for service involving a firearm. The suspect had fled prior to officer arrival, but making claims to return to the scene. Officers located the suspect vehicle and initiated a traffic stop. Officers pointed their department issued firearms at the vehicle until the suspect was taken into custody.

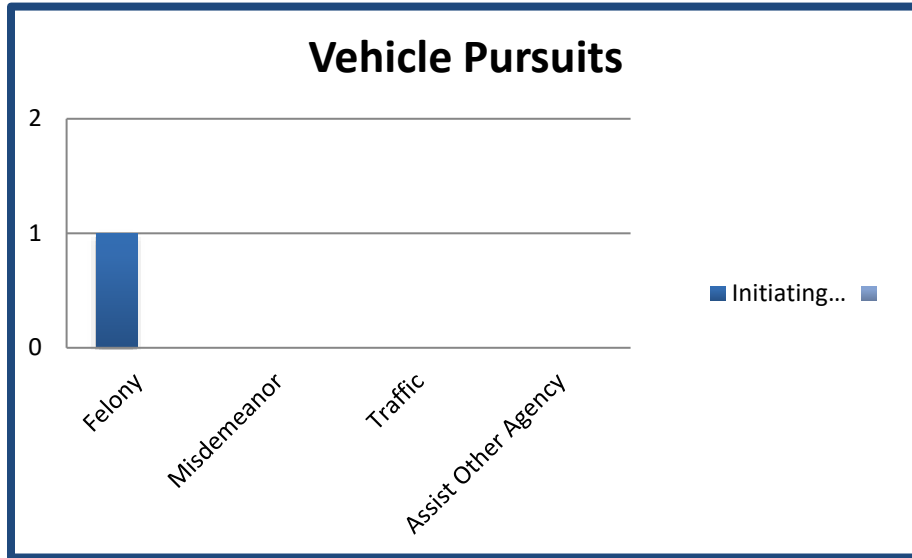
Documented report 4 involved Brownsburg Officers responding to a report of a suspicious person attempting to break into vehicle. A Brownsburg Officer located and attempted to engage with the suspect who had a mouth injury and blood on their shirt. The suspect would not respond to the officer. The suspect attempted to walk away while the officer was providing commands to stay. It appeared that the suspect was suffering from a mental health crisis and would not comply with the officer. Officers had to physically restrain and handcuff the suspect. The suspect was transported to a medical facility for an emergency detention.

Documented reports 5-6 involved Brownsburg Officer assisting on a pursuit from a surrounding agency. Brownsburg Officers successfully deployed department issued spike strips (tire deflation device) and the vehicle became disabled after crashing into a guardrail. Officers pointed their department issued firearms at the vehicle until the driver was taken into custody.

## **Vehicle Pursuit**

The Brownsburg Police Department documented one (1) Vehicle Pursuit Report during the month of June. The chart below lists the initiating violation(s):



This pursuit was initiated by the Brownsburg Police Department after reports of thefts using stolen credit cards that was occurring at a business in Brownsburg. The pursuit was terminated after several minutes due to excessive speeds and the suspects driving behavior. It should be noted that the same vehicle was located and fled from Lowell Police Department Officers. The vehicle crashed and all suspects were apprehended. Suspect information will be provided for charges in Brownsburg.

Pursuit distance was 7 miles lasting 5 minutes. No crash or damage to department vehicles was reported.

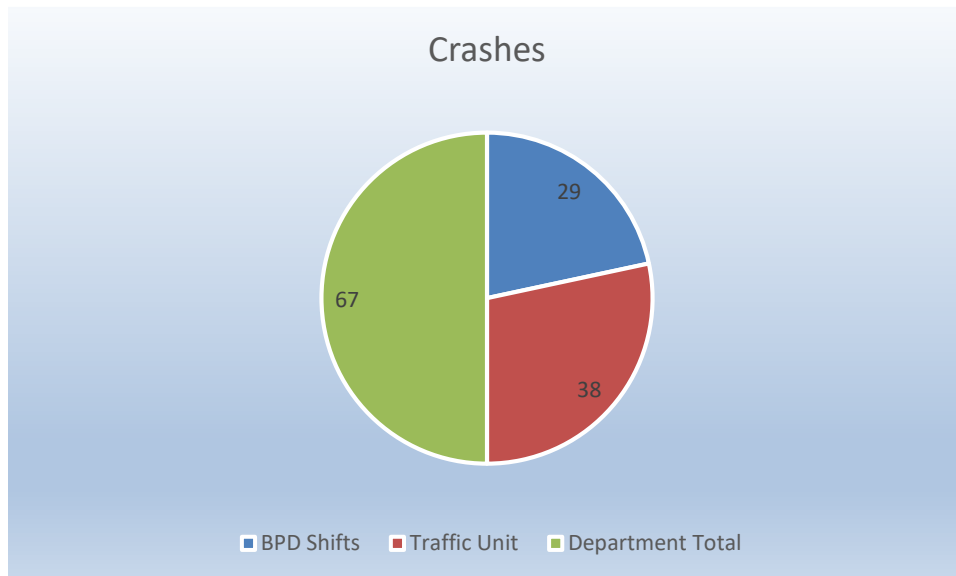

## Traffic

The Traffic Unit responded to the following workflow complaint(s) during June:

- Stop sign violations at Karleigh Drive and Kara Lane

Brownsburg Police Department investigated 67 crashes during the month of June. 38 of those crashes were investigated by the Traffic Unit.



On June 12<sup>th</sup>, Cpl. Dan Rooker and Ofc. Kevin Huntsman completed monthly motorcycle training at Lucas Oil Raceway. Training consisted of motorcycle maneuvers through multiple obstacle courses. The training assists the motor officer in maintaining their riding skills.

Cpl. Dan Rooker provided instructor hours at the Indiana Law Enforcement Academy from June 16<sup>th</sup>-20<sup>th</sup>. Cpl. Rooker instructed the basic class in emergency vehicle operations.

Cpl. Rooker and Officer Huntsman displayed their motorcycles for the police and fire camp during the month of June. A brief discussion explained the use of the motorcycle, uniforms and equipment. The discussion concluded with a small demonstration of the motorcycle operation.

## Narcotics

On June 3<sup>rd</sup>, BNU Officers assisted the Hendricks County Sheriff's Department (HCSD) in an investigation of an ATM theft. A suspect had tied a chain around an ATM in the Camby area and drug the machine behind a nearby business to come back for it. BNU Officers were able to utilize Flock LPR system to identify a vehicle and found where the suspect lives in Indianapolis and provide this info to the HCSD Detectives. IMPD SWAT served a warrant on the home and suspect was taken into custody and \$62,000.00 in US Currency was recovered.

On June 6<sup>th</sup>, BNU was given a lead through our partnership with the US Marshals (USM), that a suspect out of Texas was in a commercial vehicle possibly traveling on I-70 headed towards Indiana. The suspect was wanted for Child Molestation out of Texas. BNU Officers were able to locate and interdict the truck and take the suspect into custody at the rest park on I-70 in Hendricks County.

On June 13<sup>th</sup>, BNU Officers were working on I-74 and heard the BPD Enforcement Division investigating a domestic situation in town. An ex-boyfriend kicked in the door of a residence and was armed with a handgun. A physical altercation occurred and the suspect fled before police arrival. An hour later, the suspect called Hendricks County Communications Center (HCCC) and stated he was going to commit "suicide by cop". HCCC conducted an emergency phone ping to find location of the suspect. The first location was on I-74. BNU Officers were able to locate the vehicle on I-74, conduct a traffic stop and take the suspect into custody without incident. Enforcement Division charged the suspect with Burglary with a Deadly Weapon, Strangulation, and Criminal Confinement with a Weapon.

Also on June 13<sup>th</sup>, BNU Officers assisted DEA Indianapolis on a long term investigation take down. Several locations around Indianapolis and Louisville were raided as part of a wiretap case DEA had been conducting. In all 23 arrests were made, approximately 72 pounds of methamphetamine, approximately 4 kilograms of fentanyl, approximately 5 kilograms of cocaine, and approximately 3 pounds of marijuana were recovered, along with 54 guns, approximately \$20,000.00 and 8 pounds of silver bars.

On June 25<sup>th</sup>, BNU and USM located a missing juvenile who was being sex trafficked. Also apprehension was made of the trafficker who was also wanted on armed robbery. The missing juvenile was safely recovered and is now being taken care of by law enforcement entities.

## **Emergency Response Team**

### Training:

On June 17<sup>th</sup> and 24<sup>th</sup>, the Emergency Response Team (ERT) conducted training at the BPD Training Facility. The focus was on Close Quarters Tactics (CQT), Less Lethal and Firearms, covering core concepts such as:

- Fundamentals of entry
- Variable threshold assessments
- Hallway mitigation
- Structure clearance
- Handgun and Rifle drills
- Transition drills
- Less Lethal Classroom and Qualifications
- LFDD training with live Flash Bangs

### Deployments:

ERT was deployed on June 13<sup>th</sup> to assist DEA with a simultaneous operation in Indianapolis. TFO was the Team Lead for our assigned Target location. As a result of the entire operation netted the following:

- 23 suspects were arrested
- 72lbs of Methamphetamine seized
- 4 Kilos of Fentanyl seized
- 54 Firearms seized
- 5 Kilos of Cocaine seized
- 3lbs of marijuana seized
- \$20,000 US Currency seized

ERT was deployed on June 17<sup>th</sup> for a High Risk Search Warrant stemming from an Avon Burglary at Rural King. During the Burglary 2 suspects stole AR 15 style rifles. They were identified and located at an address on Apple Cross Dr, Indianapolis. ERT conducted a contain and callout and took the two suspects in custody. A subsequent search of the residence netted the following:

- One of the two AR 15 style rifles
- Clothing worn by suspects during burglary
- Additional information leading to the potential recovery of the second stolen rifle

### Team Status:

All ERT members remain in active status.

## Community Engagement

June 5<sup>th</sup> – The Brownsburg Police Department held another “Touch a Truck” at the Goddard School and interacted with several young children of the community. BFT Deputy Fire Marshal John Nelson also attended and brought his vehicle with equipment for display.



June 9<sup>th</sup>- 20<sup>th</sup>, This was the “Super Bowl” for Community Engagement as the Brownsburg Police Department along with the Brownsburg Fire Territory hosted a two week long summer camp attended by nearly 200 children from our community. Approximately 25 Officer’s and 5 civilian staff assisted in making this year’s camp a huge success. There were several activities for the “campers” to take part in including, Obstacle Course, Zorb Balls, Defensive Tactics, Firearm Education and Safety, Physical Fitness, Drill and Ceremony, Motorcycle Display, Bicycle Display, ERT Display and K9 Demonstration just to name a few. Captain Bullock is in talks with Lucas Oil Raceway for them to possibly host the event in 2026 due to its popularity and increase in size. Once again, we would like to send out a sincere Thank You to Mrs. Cindy Bailey for donating the funds to help with this community event.

### **Crisis Negotiation Unit**

Quarterly CNU training was conducted during June where members evaluated and critiqued a 1 hour 20 minute negotiation from Columbus Ohio.

During this incident/negotiation a subject that was in custody and within a police vehicle slipped his cuffs and gained access to firearms within the vehicle. He barricaded himself and was threatening to kill officers and himself.

To make the situation more difficult, a negotiator was only able to communicate with the suspect via the primary police radio channel. The negotiator did an excellent job during a very difficult situation/negotiation.

The situation ended peacefully due to the negotiators tactics, rapport, and promises he was able to keep.

CNU members submitted a multiple paragraph response as to the positives, negatives, and tactics utilized during the incident.
