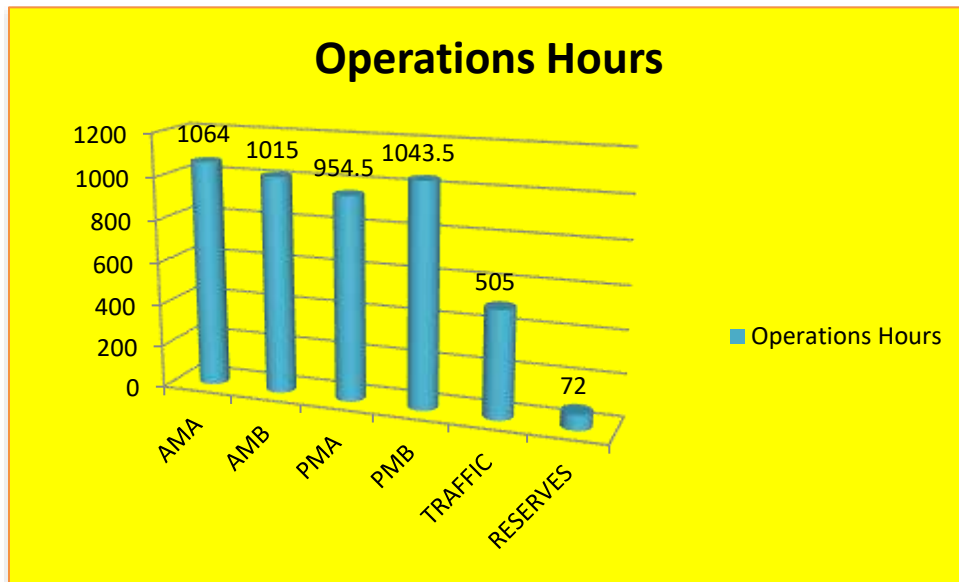

Hours

During the month of November, officers of the Operations Division worked a total of 4,582 hours. 72 total work hours were completed by the Reserve Unit.

**Total hours reflect actual road hours (training and meeting hours are excluded).



Highlights

On November 1st, Officer Donna Davenport responded to a simple theft report at a local business. During interaction and identification of the suspect, it was learned that the suspect had an active warrant. The suspect was transported to jail on the active warrant and additionally charged with theft.

On November 4th, Officer Nathaniel Giblin initiated a traffic stop for an infraction. The vehicle continued without stopping until Officer Giblin activated the siren on his police vehicle. Upon contact, Officer Giblin detected the odor of alcohol about the driver and observed the driver to make incoherent statements. Officer Giblin requested the driver to exit the vehicle for sobriety testing. The driver would not follow directions and could not complete the first test. The driver did not complete remaining tests due to previous medical issues. The driver consented to a certified breath test and was transported to the Brownsburg Police Department where the test was administered. Results of the test exceeded the legal limit. The driver was charged and transported to jail.

On November 6th, Cpl. David Koelling responded to a harassment complaint at a business on North Green Street. It was reported that the suspect was harassing multiple employees placing them in fear of their safety. Further investigation by Cpl. Koelling revealed that the suspect had a previous conviction of stalking. On November 14th, Brownsburg officers had an additional call for service in the same suspect who was then trespassed from the business on North Green Street. The suspect was uncooperative with officers. A Level 6 Felony warrant was issued by a judge and the suspect was taken into custody on November 18th.

On November 11th, Officer Donna Davenport initiated a traffic stop for an infraction. Upon making contact with the driver, Officer Davenport detected the odor of marijuana emanating from the interior of the vehicle. A search revealed a significant amount of suspected marijuana in a cup holder in the back seat. The back seat passenger admitted to ownership of the marijuana. The passenger has been charged.

On November 11th, Officer Donna Davenport responded to a report of a person down at 560 East Northfield Drive. On arrival, Officer Davenport encountered a person showing signs of intoxication. The person admitted to consuming alcohol and then driving. Witness accounts observed the subject sleeping in the vehicle and made several attempts to check their welfare. Officer Davenport administered sobriety testing to the operator of the vehicle. The operator failed all testing and consented to a certified breath test. The driver was transported to the Brownsburg Police Department where the test was administered. Results of the test exceeded the legal limit. The driver was charged and transported to jail.

On November 12th, Officer Joseph Medjeski responded to a report of residential burglary in progress. It was reported by the resident that someone was attempting to enter the residence. On arrival, officers located the suspect who showed signs of impairment. The suspect said they were trying to enter the apartment that belonged to a friend. The suspect was charged for public intoxication and transported to jail. On arrival, it was learned that the suspect possessed narcotics. Additional charges were submitted.

On November 23rd, Officer Cody Molina initiated a traffic stop on a suspected impaired driver. Upon contact, Officer Molina observed signs of impairment and requested the driver to exit for sobriety testing. The driver failed all testing and refused a certified test. Officer Molina requested and obtained a blood draw warrant. The driver was transported to a medical facility where the draw was administered. Upon completion, the driver was charged and transported to jail.

On November 25th, Officer Taylor Adamson initiated a traffic stop on a suspended driver. The vehicle drove an extended time and eventually stopped. Upon contact with the driver, Officer Adamson detected the odor of marijuana emanating from the vehicle. Officer Heather Foote assisted with the stopped and deployed her police K9 around the vehicle. The K9 showed positive indication of narcotics in the vehicle. A search revealed suspected marijuana and drug paraphernalia. The driver was charged and transported to jail.

On November 26th, Officer Devon Craig initiated a traffic stop for an infraction. Upon contact with the driver, Officer Craig detected the odor of marijuana emanating from the interior of the vehicle. The driver admitted to possessing marijuana and provided a large bag of suspected marijuana to Officer Craig. The driver has been charged.

On November 30th, Officer Lucio Argueta initiated a traffic stop on a suspected impaired driver. Upon contact, Officer Argueta observed signs of impairment displayed by the driver. Officer Argueta observed the driver making movements and requested the driver to exit the vehicle. The driver admitted to concealing a bag of marijuana. The bag was recovered and the driver was transported to the Brownsburg Police Department for sobriety testing due to inclement weather. The driver would not cooperate during the first test but passed remaining tests. The driver consented to a certified test in the form of a blood draw. The driver was transported to a medical facility where the draw was administered. Upon completion, the driver was charged and transported to jail.

Monthly K9 Training took place on November 20th and 25th.

For Patrol, K9 teams worked on the following: Obedience, Blind Detection Exercises and Controlled Negative Detection Exercises, tracking and area search into a wooded area at night.

For Detection K9 teams trained on 10 vehicles where four (4) had odors and 20 rooms where six (6) had odors in them. They also searched 25 parcels where 4 had odors inside the parcel.

Officer Clonce and Capt. Bullock began training on November 17th with Max and Martel to imprint the new K9's on narcotic odors. Both K9's are doing very well in their training. This training will conclude on December 12th and both K9's will be certified for narcotic detection.

Officer Sarena Clay was selected as the new K9 handler to replace Cpl. Shedrow on his departure from the K9 program effective December 31st.

Officer Clonce will be replacing Officer Dave Marcum on December 31st as well.

All Probationary Officers in the Training Program have successfully completed phase 3 and have advanced to phase 4. Officers are quickly nearing completion of the Training Program and could potentially be available for solo patrol within the coming weeks. Hours reflected above are through the end of November.

Use of Force

The Brownsburg Police Department documented three (3) Use of Force Reports during the month of November. The reports are classified as follows: Taser and Weaponless Physical.

Documented reports 1-2 involved Brownsburg Officers initiating a traffic stop for an infraction. Officers detected the odor of marijuana emanating from the interior of the vehicle during their investigation. The driver was being uncooperative during the investigation and was asked to exit the vehicle. Initially the driver walked to the rear of the vehicle and then attempted to walk back to where the officer was preparing to search the vehicle. The officer tried to stop the driver when the driver swatted the officer's hands. The driver resisted when the officer attempted to physically restrain the driver. An assisting officer drew and deployed his department issued taser causing successful neuromuscular incapacitation. The driver was successfully handcuffed but continued resistance by attempting to pull away from officers. The driver was treated by medics and taken to a local medical facility for clearance prior to being transported to jail.

Documented report 3 involved Brownsburg Officers attempting to locate a wanted person for felony stalking and misdemeanor harassment. The wanted person was known to be uncooperative with officers on previous calls for service. Officers located the subject who initially ran from officers then stopped after officers gave verbal commands. The wanted subject appeared to be non-compliant after getting on their knees. The officer was behind the wanted subject and used his foot to force the subject to the ground. The subject was handcuffed and transported to jail.

Vehicle Pursuit

There were no Vehicle Pursuit Reports documented during the month of November.

Traffic

The Traffic Unit responded to the following workflow complaints during November:

- Speeding and disregarding signs on East Northfield Drive
- Speeding and disregarding signs on County Road 400 North/County Road 900 East
- Speeding and stop sign violations on Thornburg Parkway
- Reckless driving throughout the Walmart parking lot

There were 80 crash reports documented during the month of November. 14 of the crash reports were hit and run. Crash data continues to be higher than normal but less than the previous month. Currently, there is a federally funded enforcement project focusing on aggressive driving and impaired driving. This project began on November 26th and will last until December 31st. During this time, officers will saturate high traffic areas where accidents have been known to occur. Additionally, officers will educate violators and take necessary enforcement action.

Cpl. Dan Rooker instructed Emergency Vehicle Operations (EVO) at ILEA November 3rd to November 7th. Additionally, Cpl. Rooker instructed annual EVO training for the Brownsburg Police Department November 8th, 25th and 26th.

Officer Dimitry Kalyuzhny attended department EVO training and a TAC shoot during the month of November.

Officer Jacob Smith attended a TAC shoot during the month of November. Additionally, Officer Smith attended and successfully completed Critical Incident Stress Management (CISM) training from November 12th to November 14th. CISM training prepares the officer to be able to have open discussion with officers and other first responders who have experienced a traumatic event during their duties and give guidance and support throughout the event.

Narcotics

On November 3rd, Brownsburg Narcotics Unit (BNU) Officers assisted the United States Marshals (USM) in apprehending a parole violator in Indianapolis. He was wanted on narcotics and firearms charges and hiding out on the south side. After using less lethal rounds, the suspect was taken into custody on the outstanding warrant.

On November 12th, BNU Officers traveled to Cleveland, OH at the request of the Cleveland High Intensity Drug Trafficking Areas (HIDTA) Office and the Cleveland Cartel, Gang, Narcotics and Laundering (CGNL) Task Force to conduct a 1-day hands training of Truck Stop Surveillance and Interdiction. Cleveland HIDTA and CGNL are attempting to focus more on drug trafficking involving commercial vehicles. Since the training, we have already received calls from Cleveland with success of identifying a truck company smuggling into the Cleveland area.

On November 17th – 20th, BNU Officers traveled to northwest Illinois at the request of the Illinois State Police to participate in a 3-day traffic blitz, focusing on commercial vehicle traffic traveling into Chicago from the west and southwest on I-74, I-80 and I-88. BNU Officers road with the Illinois State Police Criminal Patrol units conducting traffic stops for 12-hour days over a 3-day period. In all, approximately 32 kilograms of Cocaine were seized and one firearm.

Throughout the month of November, BNU Officers also spent long hours on surveillance, including 2 days following a semi across three states. Officers also spent several days in training with ERT training and year-end mandates.

Emergency Response Team

Training:

On November 18th and 19th, the Emergency Response Team (ERT) conducted training with the Norse Tactical Training Group. The focus was on Close Quarters Tactics (CQT), covering core concepts such as:

- Fundamentals of entry
- Threat prioritization
- Variable threshold assessments
- Threat mitigation
- Hallway tactics
- Structure clearance
- NORSE Tactical Instructor Johnny Button led both training dates.

Deployments:

- The Emergency Response Team was not deployed in November.

Community Engagement

The Community Engagement schedule was a little lighter for the month of November than in previous months.

November 10th – Department Tour for Girl Scouts. Officer Crosby helped and conducted a tour of the Police Department for a local Girl Scout Troop and handed out “Goodie” bags for the troop including the adult leaders that attended.

They loved her so much; they all want to take her self-defense class sometime! We had a great experience and really appreciate the communication and effort your department put forth for us. “

November 11th – In celebration of Veteran’s Day Captain Bullock along with Officer Heather Foote and Austin Hyde (Both of whom are Marine Corps Veterans) went to Pittsboro United to read to the preschool children from a book that narrates what some military/veteran adults do for a living.

Officer Foote also performed a K9 Demo for the preschoolers and explained what the K9s do for our agency while Captain Bullock played intense Tug-of-War with “Raptr” using a ball.



Several meetings in November also took place to plan for the “Christmas Under The Stars” parade that is taking place on Saturday December 6th at 6pm. The Brownsburg Police Department is working closely with the Parks Department and the Street Department to make this a successful and safe event.
